**OPREP-3 Procedures:
Nonnuclear Event or Incident Report**

***This regulation supersedes USAREUR Regulation 525-306, 14 February 1991.**

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Summary. This regulation provides procedures for preparing reports of nonnuclear events or incidents in the Army in Europe.

Applicability. This regulation applies to military units, IMA-E, and separate civilian organizations (for example, Army and Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES), Defense Commissary Agency (DECA)) within the Army in Europe area of responsibility.

Supplementation. Organizations will not supplement this regulation without USAREUR G3 (AEAGC-O) approval.

Forms. AE and higher-level forms are available through the Army in Europe Publishing System (AEPUBS).

Records Management. Records created as a result of processes prescribed by this regulation must be identified, maintained, and disposed of according to AR 25-400-2. Record titles and descriptions are available on the United States Army Records Management and Declassification Agency Web site at <https://www.arims.army.mil>.

Suggested Improvements. The proponent of this regulation is the USAREUR G3 (AEAGC-O, DSN 370-8906). Users may suggest improvements to this publication by sending DA Form 2028 to the USAREUR G3 (AEACG-O), Unit 29351, APO AE 09014-9351.

Distribution. D (AEPUBS).

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1. PURPOSE

This regulation prescribes procedures for preparing reports of nonnuclear events or incidents within or near the boundaries of U.S. Army controlled installations in the European theater or areas that may be of immediate interest to the CG, USAREUR/7A; HQDA; Commander, USEUCOM; or the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

2. REFERENCES

Appendix A lists references.

3. EXPLANATION OF ABBREVIATIONS

The glossary defines abbreviations.

4. SCOPE

This regulation does not eliminate the requirement to submit—

- a. Serious incident reports (SIRs) (AR 190-40, USAREUR Reg 190-40) through provost marshal channels. Criteria in this regulation may require reports through both command (operational) and provost marshal channels.
- b. SIRs and nuclear accident or incident reports through DA channels.

5. RESPONSIBILITIES

Commanders, including installation coordinators and community commanders, are responsible for reporting events or incidents, as defined in this regulation, as soon as they become aware of the events or incidents.

- a. The Serious Incident Reporting System is used by military police, with release authority of garrison commanders, to report actual and alleged incidents or acts, primarily criminal in nature, that, due to their nature, seriousness, potential for adverse publicity or potential consequences, warrant timely reporting to HQ USAREUR/7A and HQDA. Only the Office of the Provost Marshal, HQ USAREUR/7A, submits SIRs to HQDA. (AR 190-40, USAREUR Reg 190-40).

- b. The Operational Reporting (OPREP-3) System is used by military units, IMA-E, and separate civilian organizations (for example, Army and Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES), Defense Commissary Agency (DECA)) within the Army in Europe area of responsibility (AOR) to report significant events and incidents to the highest levels of command.

6. REPORT CATEGORIES AND CRITERIA

OPREP-3 is used in the joint reporting structure for reporting events or incidents (CJCS Manual 3150.03B). The following are authorized categories of OPREP-3 nonnuclear event or incident reports and associated code words:

a. **OPREP-3 “PINNACLE” (OPREP-3P).** This report (fig 1) immediately notifies the National Military Command Center (NMCC), through USAREUR, of any event or incident that may be of national interest, to include the following events or incidents, which happen within the USEUCOM AOR:

(1) An incident of such impact that it requires immediate National Command Authority attention. Included are incidents or events that have actual or potential international repercussions, such as an incident that creates tension or undesirable relations between the U.S. and other countries.

(2) Any incident having national-level interest that—

- (a) Has changed or may significantly change current operations.
- (b) Involves natural or manmade disasters or civil disorders.

(3) Any other incident when it is conceivable that the highest levels of Government will require timely notification. These types of incidents include, but are not limited to, the following:

- (a) Major military or missile accidents (when nuclear warheads are not present).
- (b) Incidents involving reconnaissance activities.
- (c) Hijacking and related incidents.
- (d) Receipt of significant intelligence.
- (e) U.S. search and rescue operations in foreign countries.
- (f) Confirmed or suspected electronic countermeasures, sabotage, and electromagnetic pulse events at tactical warning sensor sites, specified communications nodes, and command center locations.
- (g) Grave breaches of international law of armed conflict.

(h) On- and off-post riots, serious disturbances, or demonstrations targeted against the Army or involving Army personnel that have a severe operational impact.

(i) War crimes, including mistreatment of enemy prisoners of war, violations of the Geneva Convention, and atrocities.

(j) Requests by members of the U.S. Army for political asylum in foreign countries or indications of defection.

(k) Bomb or explosive incidents resulting in death, injury of military personnel, or damage to military property.

(l) Incidents involving material damages that seriously degrade unit operational or training readiness.

(m) Threats against Government weapons and ammunition.

(n) Information on threats, plans, or attempts to harm or kidnap, or other information bearing on the personal security of the President of the United States, Vice President of the United States, or other persons being protected by the United States Secret Service.

NOTE: Submit an OPREP-3P report if doubt exists at any level as to whether an event or incident is or could possibly develop into a matter of White House, DOD, joint service, or major news-media interest. As a practical matter, any incident reported as an OPREP-3 should be considered for submission as an OPREP-3P report unless a positive determination can be made to the contrary.

b. OPREP-3 “PINNACLE FRONTBURNER” (OPREP-3PFB). This report (fig 1) immediately notifies the NMCC, through USAREUR, of any attack on, or harassment of, U.S. Forces. Notification will be made through the USAREUR Command Center by the fastest means available.

c. OPREP-3 NONNUCLEAR EVENTS OR INCIDENTS (OPREP-3).

(1) The OPREP-3 report (fig 2) is used by any unit, garrison, or separate civilian organizations (for example, AAFES, DECA) to provide appropriate commanders with immediate notification of any incident or event where national interest is not indicated or has not been determined.

(2) A flag word may be added at any level of command to facilitate the expeditious forwarding of this message to the NMCC.

(3) OPREP-3 reporting ensures that the CG, USAREUR/7A, is notified in a timely manner of events or incidents that occur in the Army in Europe AOR.

(4) OPREP-3 reporting pertains to any accidents or incidents concerning U.S. Forces personnel or Government property or any Army in Europe local-national employees (in the course of their duties) where either the personnel or the property are involved in any of the incidents listed in appendix B.

NOTE: U.S. Forces personnel are defined as all active duty and Reserve U.S. military personnel, Department of the Army (DA) civilians, DOD contractors, and their family members.

(5) Unit and garrison commanders should also report incidents not listed in appendix B that might require notification of the CG, USAREUR/7A. The USAREUR Command Center will make the final determination whether or not the event or incident report will be forwarded to the CG, USAREUR/7A, as an OPREP-3.

(6) Appendix B lists some of the incidents to report as OPREP-3s.

7. REPORTING PROCEDURES

a. OPREP-3P and OPREP-3PFB Reports. These reports have national command-level interest and must be reported in a timely manner. Any commander having knowledge of an incident is responsible for reporting (using flash precedence) the incident to the NMCC, USEUCOM, and USAREUR within the following guidelines:

(1) **Voice Report.** Within 15 minutes after receiving the initial report, the commander will use the telephone to notify the following headquarters in the order listed below:

(a) **NMCC.** Primary: DSN (312) 851-3840; secondary: DSN (312) 227-6340, civilian: (703) 697-6340.

(b) **USEUCOM EPOC.** Primary: DSN 430-5067, civilian: 49-711-680-5067; secondary: DSN 430-5065.

(c) **USAREUR Command Center.** Primary: DSN 370-8966, civilian: 06221-57-8966; secondary: DSN 370-8662, civilian: 06221-57-8662; USAREUR switch: DSN 377-4906, civilian: 06221-39-4906.

(2) **Record Message (AMHS or DMS Official Message).** The lowest level of command with Automated Message Handling System (AMHS) or Defense Message System (DMS) capability will send an official AMHS or DMS message within 1 hour after receiving notification. If the command has no access to AMHS or DMS, the commander will send an e-mail message in the proper format with all known data to the USAREUR Command Center watch officer within 30 minutes after receiving notification. The USAREUR watch officer will draft and release the official message. As a minimum, the message will be addressed to the NMCC, USEUCOM, HQDA, and USAREUR G3.

b. OPREP-3 Reports. These are important operational reports to the chain of command but are not of national-level interest or the national-level interest has not been determined. These reports are used to provide notification to USEUCOM and HQDA. All major subordinate commands will submit OPREP-3 reports to the USAREUR Command Center. The USAREUR Command Center will then determine if the report necessitates notification to higher headquarters. If the incident is expected to produce adverse publicity, the unit will contact the first public affairs office (PAO) in their chain of command.

(1) **Initial Report.** Units will make an initial report, by either telephone or e-mail, within 30 minutes after an incident or event notification.

(2) **Record Message.** Units with AMHS or DMS capability are required to follow up the initial report with an official AMHS or DMS message within 4 hours during the week and within 8 hours during weekends or holidays.

c. Report Formats.

(1) **Voice Report.** Voice reports will usually be the most expeditious means of submitting an initial report for all types of OPREP-3 reports. The voice report will use the sample format shown below. The report will include all confirmed data as of the reporting time. Do not delay the report in order to try and obtain additional information. All reports will include at least the five Ws (who, what, where, when, why) and how, if known.

"This is an OPREP-3 Pinnacle from (state your unit) as of 041722ZJAN2005. At 041715ZJAN2005, a U.S. Army aircraft unintentionally violated Russian airspace because of navigation problems. Pilot has been contacted and is returning to base. Reason for problems are unknown. Confirmation message and additional details will follow."

(2) Record Message (AMHS or DMS Official Message). The following information, when applicable, will be included in OPREP-3P and OPREP-3PFB reports:

(a) Identification of the type of incident being reported (for example, ship harassment, aircraft accident, possible border violation, attack on U.S. soldiers).

(b) A reference to the voice report in the record communications report of the event.

(c) A brief account of the event being reported. Use concise statements designed to answer the following questions: What happened? Who is or was involved? Where did it happen? What action is ongoing? What future action is being considered?

(d) A statement in the record communications report as to whether follow-up OPREP-3P or OPREP-3PFB reports concerning the incident are expected.

(3) Record Message (AMHS or DMS Official Message). The following information, when applicable, will be included in an OPREP-3 report:

(a) The type of incident being reported (for example, minor aircraft accident, murder of foreign national).

(b) A reference to the voice report in the record communications report of the event.

(c) A description of the incident or event that has taken place; include the five Ws and how, if known.

(d) Any pertinent information concerning political ramifications and intentions, and whether an additional report will follow.

8. CLASSIFICATION GUIDANCE

OPREP-3 reports will be classified according to their content. The reporting unit is responsible for assigning the proper security classification to each report, including downgrading or declassification instructions. When combat or combat-related operational requirements make speed of delivery paramount, military commanders may modify transmission of classified information as necessary to meet local conditions.

9. PARALLEL REPORTS

Reports required by AR 190-40 and USAREUR Regulation 190-40 may duplicate OPREP-3 reports submitted on the same event or incident. Both reports may be required because of separate reporting channels.

OPREP-3 REPORTING INCIDENTS

The following are some but not all of the types of incidents that require an OPREP-3 reports.

Theft, loss, suspected theft, unaccounted for or recovered AA&E in the following quantities: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Any missile, rocket, or mine. ● Any machine gun or automatic fire weapon. ● Any fragmentation, concussion, or high explosive grenade, or other type of simulator or device containing explosive materials, including artillery or ground burst simulators. ● Any explosives, to include demolition explosives (for example detonation cords, blocks of explosives (C4)). ● Five or more semi-automatic or manually operated firearms. ● Five or more rounds of ammunition greater than .50 caliber. ● 5,000 or more rounds of .50 caliber or smaller ammunition. 	2

Examples are as follows: ³ <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Any sexual abuse of a child regardless of the nature of the injury. • Any physical injury resulting in the death of or major injury to the child. • Any child neglect that involves the deprivation of necessities and that is determined to be widespread, chronic, or potentially life-threatening. 	2
Serious child injury or death, not resulting from child abuse, while the child is in Army care at a nonmedical facility (including child development center, quarters-based family childcare home, youth activities center) or within an Army-sponsored or -sanctioned activity. This paragraph does not apply to sports injuries related to or potentially inherent in a youth activity or event.	2
Lost, stolen, unaccounted for, or recovered Government or privately owned weapons.	3
Accidental or intentional discharge of a weapon <i>with the following exceptions</i> : <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Accidental discharges on firing ranges that land within the impact area and do not result in property damage or injury. • Accidental discharges into clearing barrels that do not result in property damage or injuries. 	3
Actions taken by a foreign power against U.S. Forces personnel by the authorities of any country that does not have a SOFA with the United States.	3
Accidental fires or arson resulting in death, serious injury, or property damages exceeding \$100,000 in DOD-owned or -controlled real estate, and any fire causing the displacement of any U.S. Forces personnel on or off post. DOD-owned or -controlled real estate includes, but is not limited to the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Government buildings (for example, quarters, barracks, offices). • Government-contracted or -leased housing, office, or business space. • Department of Defense Dependents Schools (DODDS). 	2
Unusual circumstances involving U.S. Forces personnel who are missing or unaccounted for an abnormal or unusual period of time.	
Border incidents or violations involving U.S. Forces personnel. Incidents are defined as occurrences involving individuals or equipment close to a neighboring country or accidental crossing of a neighboring country border that may reflect unfavorably on the United States or the host nation.	
Critical injury or serious illness with the prognosis of death (excluding sudden infant death syndrome).	
Suicide or attempted suicide (not expected to live).	
Incidents involving firearms that cause injury or death.	2
Significant damage (exceeding \$25,000) to U.S. Government or host-nation property.	
Accidents or incidents that reduce U.S. combat capability (for example, damage to an aircraft, destruction of a tank).	1
Aircraft accidents that result in death or injury or cause damage exceeding \$10,000.	
Missing U.S. Army aircraft (an aircraft that has lost radio or radar contact with flight controllers).	
Exposure or suspected exposure to lasers inflicted by non-U.S. Forces.	
Fuel spills in excess of 100 gallons or fuel spills that contaminate a water source.	
Anti-U.S. demonstrations including persons demonstrating on or near U.S. Government installations or U.S. shared installations.	
Off-post incidents that require an unusual effort to quell by U.S. military police, host-nation police, or both.	
On- or off-post incidents involving group attacks.	1
Any incident or activity involving a risk or threat to security of DODDS facilities or buses.	
Any accident, event, or incident if adverse publicity has occurred or is expected.	
Any other incident that the commander determines to be of concern based on the nature, gravity, potential for adverse publicity, or potential consequences of the incident.	
NOTES: 1. Abbreviations in the table are listed in the glossary. 2. Drugs are identified in the Controlled Substances Act (CSA), title II of the Comprehensive Drug Abuse Prevention and Control Act of 1970 as Schedules I, II, III, IV, and V controlled substances. Schedule II-V drugs are U.S. Government controlled medical substances and are identified as R and Q controlled medical items in the Federal supply catalog. Schedule I drugs, as identified in the Act, are only used by DOD for research, and are not available through the supply system (CAT 2 SIR). 3. This does not apply to incidents of child abuse occurring within the family unit.
